

OUR NEW GREENHOUSE



If you have driven by New Horizons recently, you've probably noticed that we have an exciting new addition to our property. Thanks to a donation from RIMOL Greenhouse Systems of Hooksett, New Horizons we will be able to grow thousands of pounds of produce for use in our soup kitchen and food pantry. The greenhouse is a 30 x 72 Polycarbonate structure which is adjacent to our main facility. We also want to thank Paul Hanson, President of Mann Advertising, Steve Hanson, Dave Paris and the City of Manchester Water Works, United Steelworkers 8938 and Bill Trombly Plumbing & Heating. The growing will be overseen by Master Gardener Emily Sandblade and volunteers will be trained to work in the greenhouse. We also plan to work with interested clients and residents of Angie's Women's Shelter and teach them how to plant and grow (teach a man to fish...). This is the only urban greenhouse located in a major city in the State of New Hampshire.

TIMBERLAND SERV-A-PALOOZA

In September Timberland brought 50 volunteers to help out and work on our greenhouse and several other projects. Their 400 volunteer hours really made the jobs go faster! Timberland generously donated thousands of dollars of items: two carts, four stainless steel tables and a roller table for the food pantry. They also bought the wood for the gardening beds, brought all the tools and equipment to build them and filled them too! They painted a really neat mural on the side of the building and cleaned up the area around the greenhouse. Finally, they also brought supplies and did some painting in the dining room and dormitory. 

FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

A few weeks ago, while working in our New Horizons food pantry I saw a familiar looking face who I recognized from my days working at WMUR-TV. I had been doing a live shot of my nightly sportscast at a local business and he was working there as a Manager. We made eye contact and he came over as he knew I was the Executive Director of New Horizons and he shared his story with me. He said he had been employed by a different company since I had last seen him and had advanced to the position of Regional Vice President. After a number of years there, the company he worked for had been acquired and six months ago he was laid off. He told me that he lives in the North End of Manchester, has two children in college and has been having a difficult time finding a decent job. His unemployment was running out soon and he was trying to keep his "head above water" as he put it. He was told to go to New Horizons to see if he could get some help with groceries. At that point he said a phrase that I hear far too often, "I have driven by here hundreds of times but I never in a million years thought I would have to come looking for help." We provided him groceries for his family and he returned a couple of other times and we've not seen him since. My hope is that he is back working and things are improving for him and his family.

So often people ask me "who is your typical client?" I respond by saying there is no stereotypical client. We see people from all walks of life who are in need of our services. Sometimes it is for groceries to feed their family, sometimes it is a senior looking for a hot meal and other times it is someone who needs a hot shower and a clean bed.

As we approach the holiday season, I ask you to think of the individual who might be a friend, neighbor or family member who has hit a rough patch and comes to New Horizon saying, "I never thought I would have to come to a place like this."

1. To celebrate Ali Baba Supermarket's grand opening New Horizons received \$1,000.00 worth of food.
2. Health Dialog donated paint, supplies and volunteers to give out soup kitchen a fresh coat of paint.
3. The Merchant's Jeans Day fundraiser raised over \$700.00 for Angie's Shelter for Women
4. New Hampshire Commercial Investment Board of Realtors fundraiser raised \$950.00 in September.
5. Mrs. Marble's 3rd grade class at the St. Catherine School raised \$265.83...all in coins!
6. Texas Instruments Manchester Activities Committee challenged the TI-Manchester employees to collect at least 300 pounds of much needed toiletries -which they did!
7. Chris Bean and his company CLD Engineering donated \$2,023.00 from their annual golf tournament.
8. In July, local artists and Manchester Alderman Pat Long, Ward 3, presented six newly painted "homeless meters". These meters have been installed in six locations around downtown to collect donations to benefit the city's most needy residents. The meters are called "Spare Change Meters" and are re-purposed coin-operated parking meters set up to collect donations for New Horizons.
9. The Annual Religious Response to Hunger led by Temple Adath Yeshurun gathered 500 bags of food from many local religious organizations: Brookside Congregational Church, First Presbyterian Church, First Congregational Church, Gethsemane Lutheran Church, Grace Episcopal Church, NH Korean Presbyterian Church, Temple Adath Yeshurun, Temple Israel and Unitarian Universalist Church.
10. The 12th Annual Fight to Educate, held on September 12, 2013, raised a total of \$95,000.00 The beneficiary charities include New Horizons for NH, SEE Science Center, and the Bobby Stephen Fund for Education, each received \$31,500.00.



Thanks to the Executive Health & Sports Center – Mike Benton, Paula Joyce and Debbie Ouellette for yet another very successful road race! The Hula Hustle in memory of Bill Kelley Memorial Road race celebrated its tenth year and was tons of fun! This 5 & 10 K Road Race was held in July and raised \$15,000.00, from wonderful sponsors and runners, and was enjoyed by a record 539 runners.
